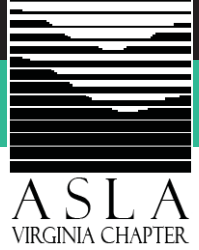

### Education Sessions and Speakers:

#### Bringing Back the Bay Through Living Infrastructure:

In this presentation, we will examine the importance of living infrastructure at the site and regional scale, integrating landscape architecture, engineering, and scientific inquiry. We will discuss how regenerative design and low impact development practices can be included in all projects for a healthier Chesapeake Bay. We will also explore the multiple objectives that can be met by applying these design principles, including water quality improvement and ecological restoration.

**Jennifer Dowdell, Associate ASLA**, has been with Biohabitats, Inc. in Baltimore Maryland since 2007. Biohabitats is an environmental consulting and design firm specializing in environmental restoration, regenerative design, and conservation planning. Since joining the firm Jenn has focused on sustainable campus masteranning initiatives, integrating green infrastructure design and planning techniques into master plans for colleges and universities across the country. Jennifer received her MLA from the University of Michigan's School of Natural Resources and Environment where she worked in Joan Nassauer's Landscape Ecology, Perception and Design Lab. The focus of her design work was on landscape ecology, brownfield redevelopment, and conservation planning.

**Phil Jones** has worked as a water resources engineer at Biohabitats in Baltimore, Maryland, since 2008. His focus is stormwater design, assessment, and planning, with an emphasis on low impact development approaches. He received a Master's in environmental engineering at the University of Maryland, College Park, where he conducted research on bioretention performance and long-term sustainability. Phil has also worked at the Low Impact Development Center in Beltsville, Maryland.

### Lynchburg's Riverfront Renaissance: Panel Discussion

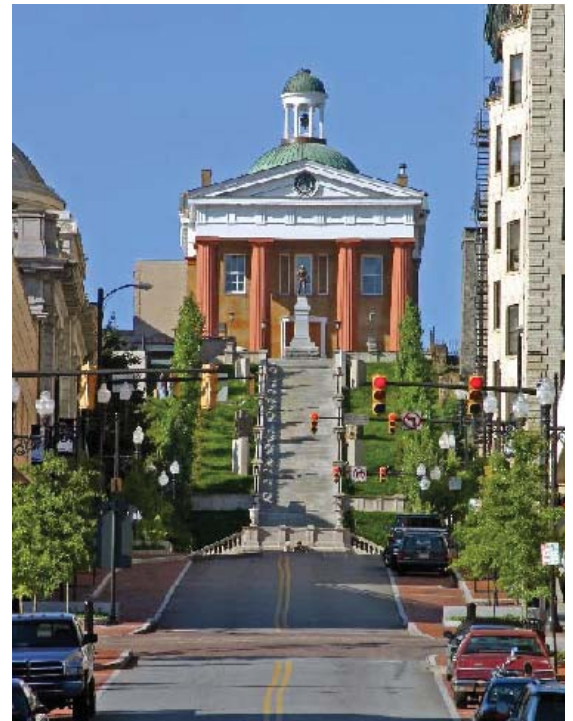
In this moderated panel discussion a group of landscape architects, planners, developers, city staff, and others will present and discuss recent development, redevelopment and revitalization projects in downtown Lynchburg that are contributing to it's riverfront area regaining its position as a vital economic, cultural, recreational and historic center to the City. Panelists include:

**Proctor Harvey, CLA, ASLA** : president of Harvey Design Land Architects. Mr. Harvey received his initial training and experience writing Environmental Impact Statements for the Virginia Department of Transportation in Richmond, VA. This valuable experience has given him a strong understanding of historic preservation and landscape design in the roadway environment. Nine years on the Lynchburg Planning Commission gives Harvey an excellent understanding of government operations. He was selected to serve on a Task Force to rewrite the City of Lynchburg's Storm Water, Erosion & Sediment Control Ordinance, 1993. He has also revised current laws with reviews from Federal, State, and Local Officials. By understanding government's commitment to its citizens, Harvey works as a team player and collaborator with municipal staff and other professionals to create cost effective and visually pleasing designs. He is proud to commit to projects from initial concept plans through working drawings, specifications, contract administration, and execution.



### **Tom Martin, AICP: City Planner for Lynchburg**

**Hal Craddock, AIA**: president of Craddock-Cunningham Architectural Partners. Following graduation from VPI & SU in 1973, Mr. Craddock joined the United States Peace Corps and spent two years in Brazil involved in urban planning work. Subsequently, he returned to his native Lynchburg and associated with Mr. Garland Gay, a local architect; and, in January of 1980, the two formed the firm Architectural Partners. Following Mr. Gay's retirement, Mr. Craddock operated Architectural Partners as a professional corporation until July 1993. At that time he and Lynn Cunningham, A.I.A., a 20-year employee of the firm, formed a new professional corporation, Craddock-Cunningham Architectural Partners (CCAP), with clients throughout Virginia.



Mr. Craddock and his partner Lynn Cunningham envisioned designed and developed the \$20 million Bluffwalk Center Hospitality Complex in Lynchburg's historic Downtown/Riverfront District along with Construction Specialist Cliff Harrison. The project contains a forty-four room boutique hotel, two restaurants, an event center and a micro brewery; and, is widely regarded as one of the pivotal success stories in the area's renaissance. In addition to managing and marketing the professional services of CCAP, Mr. Craddock continues to participate in the design and construction decisions of all projects.

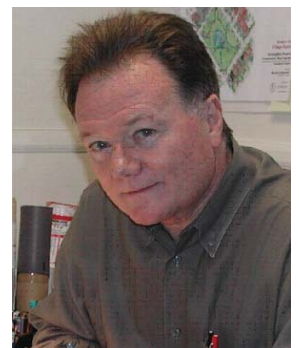
**Kennon Williams, ASLA:** currently has his own landscape architecture practice in partnership with the sustainable sites consulting firm, Greening Urban in Richmond, VA. He holds a Master of Landscape Architecture degree (1996) and a dual Bachelor of Arts degree in Studio Art and Political & Social Thought (1986) all from the University of Virginia. Prior to starting his own practice, Kennon worked for Nelson Byrd Woltz Landscape Architects (NBW) for 11 years between 1999 and 2010. At NBW, he managed and was one of the primary designers on several large-scale, award-winning projects including the new town of WaterColor in Florida; the Dell at the University of Virginia; the corporate headquarters of Automated Trading Desk in Mount Pleasant, South Carolina; and a water resources master plan for Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden in Richmond. All of these projects have been recognized for the integration of environmental preservation/restoration with design. Kennon has also participated in a number of urban community and design charrettes in places as diverse as Portland, Oregon; the Washington D.C. area; and Moscow, Russia. Recent work includes revitalization projects in downtown Lynchburg, Virginia; urban infill design in the Netherlands; master plan studies at George Mason University; a master plan for a 300-acre sustainable development in Natchitoches, Louisiana; and a master plan for a potential 4,000-acre state park in Albemarle County, Virginia.



Kennon's particular interests lie in community and urban design and site planning that supports biodiversity and sustainable site hydrology. He lectures and has served as an expert on panels related to these topics. Currently, he is a member of the State of Virginia Technical Advisory Committee for the development of new stormwater regulations. Prior to joining Nelson Byrd Woltz, he worked on projects for the Nature Conservancy and Biohabitats, an environmentally-oriented firm headquartered in Baltimore, Maryland.

**Barry Carpenter, ASLA:** is the president of Sympoetica. Carpenter is an award-winning master planner and designer with over thirty-five years of experience in community and town planning, corridor planning, urban design, and heritage/recreation planning. In 1986, he founded Strategic Land Planning, Inc. in Alexandria, Virginia. The firm, now located in the Shenandoah Valley, has since 2001 been known as Sympoetica, a name that embodies a collaborative approach to community planning. Prior to founding Sympoetica, he was a senior master planner for the community developer The Rouse Company and a Senior Associate with the consulting firm EDAW.

Over his career, Mr. Carpenter has created numerous master development plans for both private- and public-sector clients, thus providing him with a unique understanding of the community development process and players. He is a certified Landscape Architect (Virginia) and member of the American Society of Landscape Architects. He has participated in Urban Land Institute Advisory Panels on mixed-use projects nationally, and for four years he was on the Smart Growth Alliance Project Recognition Jury in the Washington, DC region. Mr. Carpenter's innovative work on Transit-Oriented Development has been published nationally in Urban Land and Landscape Architecture magazines.



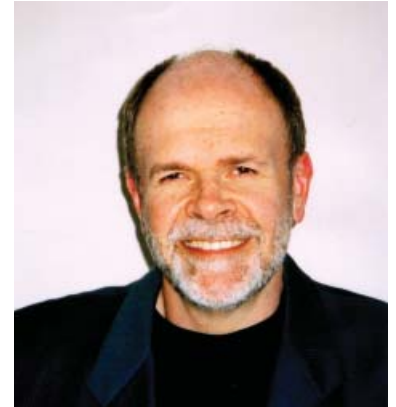

### Planning and Doing for the Sustainable Century:

Landscape architects have always been environmental leaders in our communities, and you are now needed more than ever. As a nation and as a region, we will experience tremendous population and economic growth over the coming decades. This presents both challenge and opportunity, and it is critical to get it right. We will look at examples from several scales of sustainability planning and development, from metropolitan regions to cities, suburbs, neighborhoods, and development parcels. We will show how these models address important elements, such as transportation; water; land conservation; access to jobs, shops, services, and fresh food; equity; and emissions. We will also show how the new evaluation system LEED for Neighborhood Development can help guide thinking and planning for sustainability and look at many examples of successful projects in older and newer communities. Together we will discuss who is doing great work and how we can learn from each other to make our work even more responsive to 21st-century challenges.



***Kaid Benfield:*** Kaid Benfield is director of sustainable communities and smart growth at the Natural Resources Defense Council in Washington, DC. He leads the organization's activities on behalf of smart growth and sustainable land development in America. These include research, public education, and work with all levels of government and the private sector.

Kaid co-founded LEED for Neighborhood Development, a national process for defining and certifying smart, green land development under the auspices of the U.S. Green Building Council. He is also a founder and board member of Smart Growth America, a nationwide coalition of one hundred organizations working together on revitalizing cities, building walkable, inclusive neighborhoods, and stopping the spread of suburban sprawl.

Kaid was recently voted one of the world's "top urban thinkers" in a comprehensive online poll and was also named one of the nation's leading voices for sustainability by the Partnership for Sustainable Communities. He has authored or co-authored many leading publications on smart growth, transportation and sustainability, including the 2009 book *Green Community*, the 2007 book *Smart Growth in a Changing World*, the 2001 book *Solving Sprawl*, and the 1999 book *Once There Were Greenfields*. He writes "Village Green" commentary for The Huffington Post and Daily Kos web sites, along with a popular daily blog on NRDC's web site dedicated to community and development issues.

Kaid has also served as chair of the environmental task force of the Congress for the New Urbanism, a member of the National Academy of Sciences public advisory board on transportation and the environment, and of several other steering committees and boards relating to smart growth and transportation.

Before serving as NRDC's sustainable communities director, Kaid served in a variety of capacities, including director of the organization's smart growth and transportation work, director of national forest advocacy, and legal affairs coordinator. Prior to coming to NRDC, Kaid worked at the U.S. Department of Justice, and in private legal practice in Washington, D.C. He is a graduate of Emory University and Georgetown University Law Center.

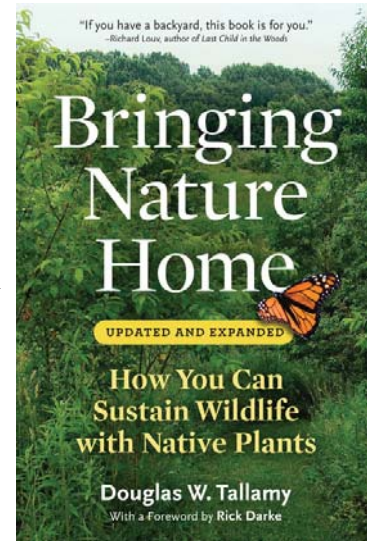

### **Bringing Nature Home; How Native Plants Sustain Wildlife in Our Gardens**

Because our gardens and managed landscapes are part of the terrestrial ecosystems that sustain humans and the life around us, we must keep them in working order. To do that we can no longer view plants only as ornaments but must consider all of their roles when selecting them for our gardens. Tallamy will discuss the important ecological roles of the native plants in our landscapes, emphasize the benefits of designing gardens with these roles in mind, and explore the consequences of failing to do so. Gardening in this crowded world carries both moral and ecological responsibilities that we can no longer ignore.



**Doug Tallamy:** Doug Tallamy is Professor and Chair of the Department of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology and director of the Center for Managed Ecosystems at the University of Delaware in Newark, Delaware, where he has authored 73 research articles and has taught Insect Taxonomy, Behavioral Ecology, and other courses for 30 years. Chief among his research goals is to better understand the many ways insects interact with plants and how such interactions determine the diversity of animal communities. His book “Bringing Nature Home; How Native Plants Sustain Wildlife in Our Gardens” was published by Timber Press in 2007 and was awarded the 2008 silver medal by the Garden Writer’s Association.

### **Wyndhurst and Lynchburg’s Riverfront Park: Case Studies**

Wyndhurst is a 450 acre Traditional Neighborhood Development within Lynchburg designed to house approximately 6,500 people at completion. It was the first project developed under the City of Lynchburg’s PUD Ordinance and was the impetus for the ordinance’s creation in the mid-nineties. Anchored by The Summit healthcare and assisted living facility and the Jamerson YMCA; Wyndhurst contains a mix of single-family housing, apartments, condo’s, retail shops, offices, restaurants, parks and trails. Wyndhurst is a unique neighborhood with a unique development story.

The plans for Lynchburg’s Riverfront Park and adjacent streets propose a sustainable vision for the revitalization of the Downtown Riverfront. Nelson/Byrd/Woltz was selected by the City of Lynchburg to develop an Implementation Plan for the area in 2006. NBW assessed the existing conditions in relation to its master plan for the entire downtown area (by Sasaki Associates in 2002). This four-month effort culminated in a plan that identifies and prioritizes a series of achievable projects between Commerce Street and the riverfront. Included in the plan are an eight-acre Riverfront Park and the renewal of nearby urban streets with multiple spaces for recreation, interpretive facilities, and gathering. The plan includes a re-imagined mixed-use pedestrian corridor,

restored streets, and public ways with dedicated outdoor café spaces, play areas, a large canal basin, fountains, and an events plaza. The design process involved several meetings with City and private stakeholders and was endorsed by City Council in 2006.

Specific projects were identified within the Implementation Plan and a Phasing Plan was developed. The first Riverfront Park project, Jefferson Street North, was opened to public in June 2010. Second and third phases of the project - Jefferson Street South and the Lower Bluff Walk - are currently under construction and will complete the streetscape adjacent to Riverfront Park and provide a dedicated pedestrian corridor from the Park to Commerce Street that will include overlooks, plazas, ramps, and stairs. Along the street and pedestrian corridor, the City is providing spaces for outdoor dining and art exhibitions. New mixed-use residential and retail buildings are also envisioned. Included in this work are design guidelines for the site development and architecture in the area. As part of this project, NBW initiated a detailed stormwater management strategy that will enable the City of Lynchburg to be better stewards of the James River Watershed and provide a model for sustainable practices in the region. An integral part of this project is the re-direction of polluted runoff from the overburdened, combined City sewer system to new porous parking areas and extensive rain gardens. The rain gardens have flowering native plants, interpretive signage, and will be an educational and aesthetic asset to the park.

**presented by: *Barry Carpenter, Tom Martin, Kennon Williams and Warren Byrd:*** As founding principal, Warren Byrd has led the firm in a wide range of public and private landscape projects throughout the United States, as well as Canada, New Zealand, the Netherlands, Brazil, Baja Mexico, Antigua, Russia, and China. Recent and current work includes the Flight 93 Memorial in Shanksville, PA with Paul Murdoch Architects of Los Angeles, CA; a two-block urban sculpture garden on the Gateway Mall in St. Louis, MO; the Dell stormwater park at the University of Virginia; the Asia Trail at the National Zoo in Washington, D.C.; the restoration of Montalto at Monticello in Albemarle County, VA; master landscape plans for Caltech in Pasadena CA, St. John's College in Annapolis MD, and the University of Miami FL in Coral Gables; the landscape master plan for Watercolor's 500-acre community on the Gulf Coast of Florida; the City of Lynchburg's urban waterfront park on the James River; and several residential projects in Virginia, North Carolina, and New York. The work of the firm has garnered over 60 national and regional design awards within the past ten years.

In addition to his 30+ years of practice, Warren taught for 26 years at the University of Virginia, serving as Chair of the Department of Landscape Architecture for seven years. His many honors have included an All-University teaching award, a CELA teaching award, and two Bradford Williams Medals for articles published in Landscape Architecture magazine. Now a Professor Emeritus, Warren's particular focus, in both his teaching and his practice, has been on the understanding and adaptation of natural systems and plant communities as they might best influence sustainable strategies of design. He received his B.S. in Horticulture from Virginia Tech in 1975 and his Master of Landscape Architecture from the University of Virginia in 1977. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Landscape Architects.

### Tours

**Old City Cemetery:** established in 1806, Lynchburg's Old City Cemetery is A Virginia Historic Landmark on the National Register of Historic Places. It is also the oldest continuously-operated public cemetery in Virginia. Once described as a "grave garden," the cemetery encompasses a diverse ecosystem, including an arboretum of primarily 19th-century plantings. Our tour will cover a selection of the following topics and cemetery areas: Antique Roses--Over 200 Varieties Throughout the Cemetery, Old-Fashioned Shrub Garden and Its Architectural Relic Sculpture, Butterfly Garden and Lotus Pond, Birds for Early Risers or Late Comers, The Cemetery Bees and Beekeeper at Work, and Composting and Demonstration Garden. Find out more at <http://www.gravegarden.org/> Transportation from the Craddock Hotel will be coordinated with tour participants prior to tour date (will most likely include carpooling). The tour will be guided by Ted Delaney, the cemetery's archivist and curator.



**Riverfront Park:** explore Lynchburg's new Riverfront Park with it's designers on this walking tour. The plan includes a re-imagined mixed-use pedestrian corridor, restored streets, and public ways with dedicated outdoor café spaces, play areas, a large canal basin, fountains, and an events plaza. An integral part of this project is the re-direction of polluted runoff from the overburdened, combined City sewer system to new porous parking areas and extensive rain gardens. The rain gardens have flowering



native plants, interpretive signage, and are an educational and aesthetic asset to the park. This walking tour will leave directly from the Craddock Hotel and will be divided into two groups due to the large amount of interest.

Warren Byrd, FASLA and Jocelyn Kelley, ASLA, of award winning design firm Nelson, Byrd, Woltz, will be presenting on preparing and submitting successful awards. Attendees are encouraged to come with specific questions and award submittal examples for review and feedback.

### **Friday Night Social Event**

We are planning on providing our attendees with a really unique experience on Friday night: a Lynchburg Hillcat's baseball game at historic City Stadium! We will be hosting a private reception in one of the stadium's new skyboxes for our conference attendees that will include all-you-can-eat hotdogs and hamburgers and other ballpark delicacies and adult beverages. The Hillcats have a huge amount of community support and their games are really fun events that always end with fireworks. Southpaw (their mascot) has been invited.

City Stadium was completed in 1939 and was constructed as part of the New Deal's Work Progress Administration programs. In 2002 there was a 6.5-million dollar renovation to the stadium. It included a new concourse with the addition of chair back seats, a new picnic area, two new concession stands, eight luxury boxes, a new press box, spacious bathrooms and a new scoreboard. Groundbreaking for the project was on October 8, 2002. The renovations were completed in time for the 2004 Hillcats season. The following season six more skyboxes and a state of the art video board were added.

The Hillcats drew a new all-time attendance record during the first year of the renovated stadium, as more than 148,000 fans filed through the gates. Every season since then over 150,000 fans have experienced all that City Stadium has to offer. In 2008, the attendance soared to over 162,000 fans! Lynchburg City Stadium has been home to baseball for nearly 70 years. Over that time the Lynchburg faithful have seen the Hill Climbers, Shoemakers, Grays, Senators, Cardinals, White Sox, Twins, Rangers, Mets, Red Sox and Hillcats take to the diamond. No team has spent more time playing at City Stadium than the Hillcats who enter their 15th season in 2009.

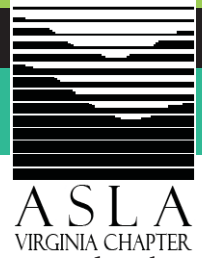
